






HUNT REPORTS

dream hunt is what **RUSSELL HEWS** of Klamath Falls, Oregon titled his big horn hunt. It was near midnight on the 23rd of September when his hunting party reached the Jack Creek Trail head about 26 miles west of Meeteetse in area 5. The sky was filled with stars and the air clear and crisp, a far cry from his scouting trip of a month earlier. At that time the skies were smoke filled from record breaking fires here in the west. Russell had the good fortune to develop a friendship with elk hunter Kurt Eisenach of Sheridan and sheep hunter Dave Stenson from Guernsey, who were hunting in the same area, and were willing to help him. Also along were farther-in-law Bruce Froemke and friend Daniel Cooney. On the 24th they moved out on the quest for the bighorn. Several sheep, elk, and deer, as well as grizzly, were seen, but it was not until the following day, when the party had split up, did Russell spot the ram of his dream. On the morning of the 26th Russell, Kurt, and Daniel packed up to Piney Creek to try and stalk the ram of the previous day. The ram was spotted but the only real approach was to drop into the creek bottom for cover, and advance up stream. It was a plan that worked to a "T"! The combination of the stalk, Russell's



climb from the streambed to gain altitude, and the rams feeding toward him, made for 2 perfect shots, the first 315 yds and the second 355 yds. "It would take a night spent up on the mountain huddled in some rocks and two days before we got the ram to the trail head. Thanks to my wife who enables me to do things like this, Bruce, my father-in-law, and Kurt and Dave, new Wyoming friends for their willingness to do whatever it took to make this a successful hunt". Dave Stenson shot his trophy ram on the second day, and both of the bighorns were 8 1/2 years old. Russell also wanted to give "a very personal THANK YOU", to Kevin Hurley, WY G & F biologist, who gave him all of the helpful information in order to complete a successful bighorn hunt.

During the term of my presidency I am going to make an effort to get more of you involved in the chapter, and whatever business is at hand, and I encourage you to contact any of the board members with your input.



Wild Sheep and Wildfire Effects of the 2000 Fire Season

Like many other western states, Wyoming experienced a dramatic fire season in summer 2000. More than 600 fires burned approximately 280,000 acres, from Yellowstone National Park to Laramie Peak, and from Flaming Gorge to the Black Hills. The single largest fire was the Kate's Basin Complex, which burned approximately 137,600 acres on the Wind River Indian Reservation, west of Thermopolis.

With 6,700 Rocky Mountain bighorn sheep spread throughout many Wyoming mountain ranges, wildfires and sheep habitat were bound to come together. Where wildfires burned in bighorn sheep habitat, preliminary evaluations by Wyoming Game and Fish Department, U.S. Forest Service, National Park Service, Bureau of Land Management, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Bureau of Indian Affairs and Wind River Reservation Tribal biologists indicate a short-term loss of forage but likely long-term benefits to wild sheep.

Burning decreases shrub and tree cover, opens up migration corridors between seasonal bighorn ranges, and enhances the ability of wild sheep to detect and escape predators. The flush of nutritious, palatable post-burn forage should improve body condition, lamb birth weights, lamb survival, and overall herd vigor. According to Kevin Hurley, Wyoming Game and Fish Department wildlife biologist in Thermopolis, "bighorn sheep habitats have been shaped by periodic fire through evolutionary time. Generally speaking, there is a very positive relationship between wildfire and quality of bighorn sheep habitat in the northern Rocky Mountain region."

"Since bighorns are primarily grazers, post-fire herbaceous growth of perennial bunchgrasses (e.g., bluebunch wheatgrass) will be a real boon for wild sheep," said Gary Butler, Wyoming Game and Fish Department Terrestrial Habitat Program Manager in Cheyenne. "Not only will fire improve spring and fall transition ranges, but forage production on crucial winter ranges should be greatly enhanced,"

said Butler. Post-burn moisture and warm fall days actually led to new growth of preferred grasses, and in many cases, "bighorn sheep will go onto late fall and early winter ranges with green grass," added Hurley.

On many bighorn ranges in Wyoming and the Rocky Mountain West, lack of periodic fire has led to subtle but definite successional changes in vegetative communities, to the detriment of wild sheep. Sagebrush/ grassland habitats which once provided high-quality, high-visibility foraging areas for bighorns have been encroached upon by juniper and limber pine, as wild-fires have been quickly suppressed. The historic fire frequency in many of these habitats was probably every 10-40 years (or longer, depending on the species of sagebrush and the geographic area), but almost 100 years of active fire suppression have altered this fire-dominated regime.

Across Wyoming, prescribed burning to improve bighorn sheep habitat has been a priority management focus in recent years. Opportunistically, some of the summer 2000 wildfires burned in areas slated for prescribed burning, including wildfires near Laramie Peak, Whiskey Mountain, and the Hoback River drainage. An interesting note is that where prescribed or wild fires have burned in recent years, summer 2000 fires either did not start at all or they tended to extinguish themselves more readily than in areas where no burning had occurred recently.

Winter 2000-01 bighorn sheep ground and aerial surveys will provide much-needed information on population size, seasonal distribution shifts (if any), and lamb survival, but preliminary evaluations indicate summer 2000 wildfires were more beneficial than detrimental to Wyoming's wild sheep herds.





A TALE OF TWO RAMS - HUNT AREA 19



am going to paraphrase a story by Ryan Amundson, WY G & G biologist, and WY FNAWS member. 24 days later and 30 pounds lighter, JIM SMITH of Gillette, and WY FNAWS Life member, harvested his first bighorn in area 19, the Laramie Range of SE WY.

Jim started the season hunting with local outfitters Brian Artery & Clark Noble, owners of Hunton Creek Outfitters of Wheatland. A week was spent on Split Rock, west of Wheatland. Jim encountered extremely tough conditions this fall, as temperatures were high and the summer drought had adversely affected water availability and forage on the rugged mountain. Several sheep were seen in the Duck Creek area, where more palatable and nutritious forage could be found. Determined not to give up, Jim hunted an additional 10 days S of Split Rock, in the rugged foothills of Sybille Canyon. After 18 days of hunting private and public lands, of the many sheep they saw, none were legal.

Jim returned to Gillette, rested up a bit, waited for cooler weather, then returned to SE Wyoming to continue his quest for a ram. He returned several times to old and new haunts including Bearhead Mountain, an area burned during the 1995 fire. In late October Jim moved north to the LaBonte Canyon area, and after a brief snowstorm, he spotted 2 rams feeding in an open park. As Jim hiked through heavily forested, steep, rocky terrain, he could hear the cracking of heads. As he approached the sparring rams they split apart, providing an excellent broad side shot at the largest ram. The ram had 13 ½ " bases, was 14 ½ years old, and scored 154 B&C. A great trophy for a dedicated and determined hunter from Gillette!

Now, I would like you to compare Jim's ram to that of Truman Wilkin's, which was only 4 ½ years old and scored 169! Wilkins' ram, the longer of the 2, was not only younger but longer at 35", while Smith's older ram, by 10 years, was 32.5" long. They hunted in the same area. As Ryan Amundson points out, this is a perfect example of quality and quantity of forage, and if any of you would like Ryan's complete story on these 2 hunts, and the comparison of the 2 rams, please give me a call.




ife member of the WY Chapter, TRUMAN WILKIN, from Cedar Rapids, Iowa killed his ram in area 19. He hunted ✓ with Dan & Brian Artery in September, in the Split Rock area, and in October at Reese Mountain. Truman saw about 10 rams during his September hunt, but it was extremely difficult to verify their 3/4 curl legal status. In October there was no question about the rams they located, and another successful hunt was completed. Truman said the outfitters and guide, Dave Gamlin, were excellent and hard working. He went on to say, "I felt very fortunate to be able to draw a WY tag and hunt with great people, and succeed in getting a trophy ram". As a footnote to this story the WY G & F Dept. determined this ram was only 4 ½ years old, had 16 " bases, and green scored 169 B&C, yes, that's right, a 4 1/2 year old Wyoming ram! Two days ride with guides George Klein and Tom Van Veen brought them to camp, previously occupied 4 years earlier. Needless to say the rodents had converted the cabin to their own use! Day three the hunting began in earnest, and shortly after leaving camp 3 rams were spotted. Briefly distracted while



unsaddling, everybody suddenly realized a sow grizzly and 2 cubs had spooked the sheep up into a snow covered basin. After a difficult stalk it was agreed Mike would have first choice. He hit the ram from a perfect dead rest over a rock ledge. The Fannin monarch was 13 years old and carried a magnificent trophy head with 40 3/4" X 38 1/4" X 13" for green score of 163 5/8 B&C. On day 9 Mike and guide Tom also claimed a grizzly for Mike.

After 11 days of every kind of hunting weather you can imagine, rain, snow, fog, sleet, more fog, Dave and guide George were still at, concentrating 100% on finding a trophy ram for Dave. On the 12th day, after a long morning ride, George literally flew out of his saddle to avoid 3 rams from spotting him, as they were moving along a bench directly above the hunters, less than ½ mile away. After an agonizing discussion both Dave and George decided it would not be prudent to literally risk life and limb at that time of day to pursue the rams, and the hunt would have to continue to the 13th and last day.

Early the next morning both men were pumped and rearing to go. They turned away from the Blackstone River and up the canyon a good 3 hours ahead of their previous schedule, as they were on a mission. Here I cannot fully express Dave's adrenaline and excitement, especially when George said "there they are, I see them" all while devouring a squashed and frozen sandwich and without the aid of binoculars. Suffice it to say Dave finally had his trophy, the Fannin of a lifetime. He was 9 years old and sported horns of 39 ½ X 39 X 13 ¾ for green score of 161 7/8 B&C. What a terrific conclusion to a wonderful hunt with friends!









