President's message cont...

Dave Moody and Tom Ryder, from Lander Game & Fish Office, gave us some badly needed information on the Wolf Re-introduction planned for Yellowstone Park, Idaho and Montana. The Wyoming Game & Fish Department is trying their best to get management capabilities on the wolves so that problem wolves that get outside of the Park can be controlled by trapping and removing.

The Chapter had a request for funding of up to \$2,000.00 from the No Wolf Option Committee, Arlene Hanson, of Wapiti, Wyo. The funds were to be used for attorney fees and to help put an injunction on the Federal Government to stop wolf re-introduction, until some authority is given to the state of Wyoming for management capabilities after the wolves have been introduced to Yellowstone Park. I, for one am disappointed that the members voted not to fund this request. I believe any delay of wolf re-introduction to the state of Wyoming only saves more big game animals for wild life observers, photographers and hunters to enjoy. This re-introduction of wolves will also cause a loss of revenue from hunting license sales, about 15% reduction, in anterless animals, and will cause our Game and Fish Dept. more man hours and funds to manage the wolves. These funds could be better used to help with the habitat improvement for our big game animals.

Heather Gray, Director of the National Big Horn Sheep Interpretive Center in Dubois, Wyo. presented the members with a request for \$2,000.00 to be used for the purchase of plants to be planted around the Sheep Center to show visitors the type of forage the Big Horns prefer to eat. Signs will also be installed for visitor information. This request for funding was approved by the membership.

Kevin Hurley, Wild Life Biologist, from the Wyoming Game & Fish Department at Thermopolis, Wyo. made a request for funding the transplant of Big Horn Sheep into the North Fork of Owl Creek, located North West of Thermopolis, Wyo. The request was for \$6,200.00., \$800.00 to be used immediately for G.I.S. (on the ground mapping equipment) and \$5,400.00 to be used January of 1996 for Big Horn Sheep Transplants. Forty Big Horns will be transplanted in 1996, forty in 1997, and hopefully, forty in 1998.

Eighteen radio collars will be used, four to six on rams and the balance on ewes. These radio collars will be used to track the movements of the Big Horns for the first few years. This request for funding was approved with a unanimous vote from the membership.

Kevin also gave a slide show and presentation on Big Horn Sheep management in all areas of Wyoming during the Saturday afternoon meeting. The members found it very informative and well presented. A special thanks to Kevin for this fine presentation. Mr. Ed Bangs was unable to attend this meeting due to prior commitments.

Kathy Firchow presented a request for \$2,000.00 for a Sheep Transplant of forty Big Horns into the Wind River Canyon between Thermopolis and Shoshoni, Wyo. The release site will be the mouth of Teeter Canyon on the west side of the highway. This population of Big Horns will be for viewing and photography only, as there is no hunting allowed in the canyon at this time, by anyone. The Wyoming Chapter funds will go to purchase six radio collars to be used for monitoring the movement of the Big Horns. This presentation was well received by the members and passed with a unanimous vote.

Bob Lanka from the Wyoming Game & Fish Dept. in Lander, Wyo. requested additional funding of \$3,000.00 for the on-going Big Horn Sheep Study in the Temple Peak Area, which is hunting area #11. The Wyo. Chapter previously donated \$5,000.00 towards this project and felt that the study was going well. Bob gave an excellent report on what has happened with this study during the past year. The Wyo. Chapter members felt that this was a most worthwhile project and voted to continue funding of this project with the additional \$3,000.00.

The Wyoming Chapter took under consideration a request for funding in the amount of \$1,500.00 sent in by Bert Jellison of the Wyoming Game & Fish Dept., in Sheridan, Wyo. This money is to be used for evaluation of maps and areas in the Big Horn Mountains for potential Big Horn Sheep re-introduction sites. These sites could be used for transplanting Big Horns which could eventually mingle with the Big Horn Sheep previously introduced into Shell Canyon near Greybull, Wyo. The Chapter Members voted to fund this request.

Dave Lockman, Education Supervisor for the Game & Fish Department, Cheyenne, Wyoming sent a request for funding in the amount of \$1,800.00 for development of the Outdoors Woman Program. This program would provide outdoor learning activities for women in our state. The money would be used to send two Game & Fish personnel to a three day workshop on planning and implementing a (Becoming an Outdoor Woman) program in Wyoming. The Game & Fish personnel attending the workshop in New Mexico could then implement this program in our state. The Wyoming Chapter Members voted to fund \$880.00 of this request.

Mr. Brant Junck, teacher, from Dubois, Wyo., who attended the Outdoor Leadership School in Jackson, Wyo., last summer, gave a report on the learning activities provided him at the school. He stated it was a fine learning experience for him and would like to see the Wyo. Chapter continue with funding for another teacher to attend in 1995. The cost of sending one teacher to this three day school is \$600.00. The Wyoming Chapter members voted to send at least one teacher to this school and possibly two, if sufficient applications are received from the teachers.

The Wyoming Chapter also voted to spend another \$250.00 for additional Animal Wheels which will be given out to various schools in Wyoming. These Wheels are used to give the children facts on big game animals found in North America today and are helpful in Science and Biology classes taught in our schools.

The Wyoming Chapter funded approximately \$17,000.00 this year. This is the most money ever funded by this Chapter in one year. As you can see, more money will be needed in the future to keep up with all of the worthwhile requests that this Chapter receives. I hope that more of the Chapter Membership will get involved with this organization and many new members will also join us in guiding the Wyoming Chapter in the years to come.




