

#### **CHAPTER NEWS**

The 13th annual winter banquet / auction at Cheyenne Little America is nostalgic history. With a changed format, fun was had by all. This year, instead of an all day business meeting, three afternoon hours of entertaining information was offered to the sheep enthusiast and two hours of entertainment was provided for the ladies.

Starting early Friday morning the board and interested members met to tie up a few last minute details, and then went right to work on funding requests for 1997. After a long question and answer session, the board voted its recommendation to accept or reject each funding request for consideration, by the membership, at the general business meeting Saturday. Following the board meeting many hard working volunteers cataloged the auction items and prepared for the upcoming event. When the work was done we kicked back for a general BS session complete with finger food and cocktails, a well earned reward.

Saturday started with the business meeting at 9:00 a.m. Two bylaw changes were first on the agenda: (1) The fiscal year will be changed to end April 30th to allow for better accounting of the December fund raiser. (2) Checks in the operating account will require only one signature of the president, secretary, or treasurer, we also plan to move most of the funds out of the operating account into an interest bearing money market account, which will require two of the officers' signatures on all

checks as well as all other accounts including CD's. Both changes passed unanimously.

National FNAWS mandated that no chapter could fund any funding request without their first having OK'D it. After discussion it was decided that this was not something we could live with. It was agreed we will notify National of all funding within 15 days. National has agreed to address this issue at the next National-Chapter meeting.

Helen McCracken gave a report on the Becoming an Outdoor Woman program that we have helped fund the last two years. Fifty-three were in attendance at the Whiskey Mountain camp, 3 more than the 50 full attendance. She reported that 150-200 participants could have been booked if space had permitted. WY FNAWS again showed its support for this great program by committing to 6-\$50 scholarships.

Mary Reed from Rawlins BLM made a funding request for a guzzler on the Ferris Mountains.

The board made its recommendations on funding requests at this time and after many good pointed questions the membership voted to fund: (1) \$10,000 in cost sharing on the Red Creek well requested by Sue Oberlie of the Lander BLM office. The well is going to be located on potential winter range for the Whiskey Mountain herd. (2) \$440 for teacher packet production and \$395 for educational program brochures in response to a funding request from June Sampson from the National Bighorn Interpretive Center. (3) Mary Reed's request for a

water guzzler to help alleviate stress to bighorn ewes and lambs on the Ferris Mountains was OK'D to cost share with the Wyoming Game and Fish up to \$2,000 on the project. (4) Helen McCracken request for \$300 in scholarships to Becoming an Outdoor Woman was also OK'd. (5) We also reaffirmed our commitment to the Owl Creek transplant for \$11,200 scheduled to begin January 1998. Total commitments of \$24,335 for 1997 so far on top of the \$5,000 reward money held.

Elections were held with results of your new board being: President: Iim Collins. Vice President: Cole Benton, Secretary: Nancy Collins. Treasurer: Jay Reddon, Two Year Directors: Carl Asbell and Randy Taylor. Fritz Meyer was elected to a year director term, with Mike Mohr having one year left on his Director term. Ron Ball is Past President.

The business meeting was adjourned at 11:50 for lunch.

Duncan Gilchrist lead off the afternoon entertainment with a slide show on monster rams of North America. The stuff every sheep hunter's dreams are made of! Following Duncan, Peter Kummerfeldt gave a talk and slide presentation on wilderness and high altitude survival. Many of the points that Peter brought up pertained directly to sheep hunting, and should make us better equipped for safe hunting. The last hour was a run down on the 16 sheep herds in the state, updates on the South Fork Shoshone prescribed burn, a report on the any ram areas, and results of harvest over the last 5 years, and finally Valerius Geist tour of the Wind River Range to assess the present and future of the sheep herd. Mr. Geist, from British Columbia, is recognized as the world's foremost authority on bighorns. Thanks to Kevin Hurley, Doug McWhirter and Bart Kroger from the Wyoming Game and Fish for this great hour.

Nearing the end of the information program, the ladies' wine seminar put on by Terry Ranch Cellars let out, and from the noise in the hall there was no doubt as to its success!

The happy hour and banquet started at 5:00 featuring many new and exciting activities, the Hi-Low game and M+M guess for the kids being stand outs.


Mr. Larry Brannian and Mr. Dan Gay did an outstanding job as auctioneers and made the evening! THANKS GUYS!



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### President's Thoughts


In today's climate it is easy to feel down trodden as a hunter and gun owner. One only has to look at the past and into the future of game management to have great hope.

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## **Announcing WY FNAWS Super Summer Meeting**



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## 14th Annual Banquet and Auction December 6, 1997



#### **Attention Ladies**

Wyoming Game and Fish is offering two "Becoming an Outdoor Woman" camps this year. One camp is again being held at Whiskey Mountain, June 20 thru 22nd with a registration deadline of June 2nd, and for the first time a camp will be held at the Skyline Ranch near Encampment, Sept. 5 thru 7th with a registration deadline of August 18th.

Final plans are still being made but some exciting new classes are being worked on. The workshops are divided into 3 areas of interest. Under shooting skills, they offer: Introduction to firearms (this is required, unless the student has taken hunter education, for all participants who wish to take any of the shooting classes), Riflery, Shotgun, Blackpowder, Archery, and Hunting. Under water sports classes include: Basic fishing skills, Flyfishing, Flytying, Canoeing, and Boating basics. The third category is mis-

cellaneous areas: Wildlife and nature photography, Outdoor first aid and survival techniques, Camping skills, Backpacking, Orienteering, and Campfire cooking. New classes that may be offered include plant identification at both camps, with horsepacking at Whiskey and mountain biking at the Skyline camp. All classes are set up for the beginner to introduce women to the outdoor sports.

The registration fee is \$100 which covers meals, lodging, and classes for the 3 day workshops. All equipment will be provided for the classes but if a participant wishes to bring her own equipment and learn to use it, she is welcome to do so. Partial scholarships are available. All interested ladies are encouraged to contact Helen McCracken, Hunter and Outdoor Skills Education Coordinator, at the Wyoming Game and Fish Headquarters, 5400 Bishop Boulevard, Cheyenne, WY 82006-0001. This is truly an exciting way for women to become involved in the out of doors!
