President's Message

This message finds Wyoming welcoming a new director to our Game and Fish Department. Steve Ferrell took the helm this summer and all of us at Wyoming FNAWS are pleased to have him on board. Our Chapter has had a long, successful relationship with the WGFD and we look forward to continuing that relationship in the years to come.

Hunting season is winding down and it's been a busy and successful one for our sheep hunters in Wyoming. As of the writing of this message, the Wyoming Game and Fish Department's regional office in Cody has plugged over 87 sheep – some of them extremely nice ones at that. Many very nice, mature rams have been taken across the state.

An almost certain-to-be record book ram was taken out of Area 4 as well – board member Lynn Stewart, who is also a taxidermist, net-scored this whopper at 180-2/8, and 14-6/8 X 38-1/2 on both horns.

There has also been success in the first hunt in Devil's Canyon. Wyoming FNAWS helped transplant several bighorns there in December 2004 and January 2006, and I am pleased to say that the first ram was harvested in early September. Two resident hunters drew the first Devil's Canyon licenses and both Wayne Johnson of Greybull and Bill Fadala of Jackson were successful. Congratulations to everyone!

A much-needed wildfire swept through roughly 68,000 acres of prime sheep habitat 30 miles west of Cody on the Shoshone National Forest this summer, in Hunt Area 2. The Gunbarrel Fire was caused by a lightning strike on July 26th and was therefore allowed to burn in accordance with U.S. Forest Service policy, with monitoring to ensure it didn't endanger structures or lives. Wyoming's sheep in the northwest section of the state will benefit greatly from this fire.

We took part in the annual WGFD Hunting and Fishing Heritage Expo this September. There was some schedule rearranging this year that enabled more schools to bring their students. The result was record student attendance – 2,000 more than the previous year – for a total of 12,996 attendees over the three-day event.

I would like to note that the Wyoming Chapter continues to work with the Wild Sheep Foundation and other Chapters toward strengthening our ties and teamwork. A lot of effort has gone into this so far, and with Gray Thornton at the helm, the effort stands an excellent chance of paying off.

We will be holding our winter meeting on Dec. 6th in Thermopolis—see the calendar of events for details. Members are welcome to attend and we hope to see you there.

Thanks to all of you for another great year and on behalf of your Wyoming FNAWS board, I would like to wish everyone a happy holiday season.

Terrific Turnout for 2008 Wyoming Game & Fish Hunting & Fishing Heritage Expo

The Wyoming Game & Fish Department held its annual Hunting & Fishing Expo in Casper Sept. 11-13 and Wyoming FNAWS was once again pleased to participate. WGFD Conservation Education Manager Wendy Hayes reported a terrific turnout for 2008: nearly 13,000 visitors walked through the exhibits and participated in the indoor and outdoor activities. A switch in days (Thursday through Saturday vs. Friday through Sunday in previous years) received positive feedback and an increase in the number of students who visited the event: 2,000 more than 2007.

"We had a record number of schools and students this year—education is the goal of the Expo, and this year we were able to reach 2,000 more students than in previous years!" Wendy noted. "Attendance numbers were: 8,337 (Thursday & Friday); 4,659 (Saturday) - for a grand total of 12,996 people reached."



ton National Park, Targhee National Forest-Teton Basin Ranger District and the National Elk Refuge in northwest Wyoming.

Teton Range Bighorn Sheep Resource Selection-\$25,000

The location of the study is Wyoming's Teton Range, Wyoming and includes portions of Grand Teton National Park, Bridger-Teton National Forest, Caribou-Targhee National Forest, and the Jedediah Smith Wilderness. The overall goal of this research project is to improve understanding of how and why bighorn sheep seasonally use the Teton landscape. Project affiliates are the Wyoming Cooperative Fish and Wildlife Research Unit, Wyoming Game and Fish Department, Grand Teton National Park, Bridger-Teton National Forest and the Caribou-Targhee National Forest The three-year study has multiple funding partners and will run through year-end 2010. Wyoming FNAWS' \$25,000 will fund approximately 23% of the associated costs for the fiscal year 2009. Project updates are available at www.tetonsheepproject.blogspot.com.

2008 Wyoming Hunting and Fishing Heritage Expo-\$1,000

The goal of this annual event is to instruct and introduce attendees in Conservation Education, ethics, steward-ship and outdoor skills that stress the safe and responsible use of Wyoming's wildlife and wild lands.


Whiskey Basin Meadow Rehabilitation-\$5,000

This project consists of reworking and rehabilitating Whiskey Basin Meadow and updating the irrigation system will increase the forage production and allow greater horse utilization, thereby decreasing the horse grazing impacts on crucial bighorn sheep winter range. This GIA was conditionally approved, pending WGFD and/or The Whiskey Basin Technical Committee's presentation of how the habitat will be managed long-term.

Conceptual WGFD Bighorn Sheep Program Coordinator, & WAFWA Wild Sheep Working Group Chair -\$30,000 (over two years)

This innovative grant would help provide for a full-time, focused position leading wild sheep management/ issues within the Wyoming Game and Fish Department and the Western Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies; it is anticipated that 50% time would be spent on Wyoming BHS programs/projects; 50% time would be spent on WAFWA WSWG focus/activities. This conceptual position is slated for a two-year timeframe. Wyoming FNAWS approved funding for two years at \$15,000 per year, pending additional funding needed from other FNAWS chapters, non-governmental agencies and the Wyoming Game & Fish Department.

Hunt Area 12 Re-opens with Success

As many readers of *The Rampage* know, the Devil's Canyon area (Hunt Area 12) above Lovell was opened to hunting for the first time in fall 2008. Following this population's response after the December 2004 transplant of 20 Oregon bighorn sheep, and the January 2006 transplant of 20 Montana (Missouri Breaks) bighorns, the summer 2008 population was estimated at 120-150 sheep. Given the Wyoming Game and Fish Department's recent ability to issue less than four licenses per hunt area (thanks to Wyoming FNAWS for its assistance on this!), H.A. 12 was opened for two licenses this fall, both issued to resident hunters (one from Greybull, one from Jackson). Kevin Hurley and Tom Easterly of the Cody WGFD office are pleased to report that both hunters were successful this fall, harvesting an 8-year old and a 9-year old ram. Both hunters reported seeing plenty of rams, and both hunters had very enjoyable hunts. Congratulations to both those hunters! We look forward to seeing their photos and hearing about their hunts.

Seminoe Mountain Bighorn Transplant on Hold



Outstanding Results in Cody Region Hunt Areas



Grant-in-Aids Approved at Summer Meeting

Six grant-in-aid requests were approved by the Wyoming FNAWS membership at the general membership meeting in Lander on June 7, 2008. The Wyoming FNAWS board recommended and received approval by unanimous vote for the following projects and dollar amounts:

Elk Mountain Bighorn Sheep Net-Gun Capture/GPS Radiocollaring-\$5,000

A joint project between the Newcastle BLM, Wyoming Game and Fish Department and the South Dakota Game Fish and Parks Department (SDGFP). This project will define bighorn sheep seasonal habitat use throughout the Elk Mountains in the Black Hills of Wyoming and South Dakota. Ten (10) bighorns will be captured via helicopter net-gun techniques, and fitted with GPS "store-on-board" radiocollars. Cost for this capture work is shared with SDGFP.

Teton Range Bighorn Sheep Genetics/DNA Research-\$10,000

This project is a non-invasive evaluation of the genetic status and parasite loads of Teton Range bighorn sheep in comparison to adjacent sheep herds in northwest Wyoming. The concern leading up to the research is the herd's small size and isolation that may cause it to suffer from reduced genetic variation and inbreeding, which could reduce the probability of the herd's persistence and ability to adapt to future environmental change (e.g., disease challenges).

The research will take place in areas of the Bridger-Teton National Forest, Jackson Ranger District; Grand Te-

Hunt Area 24 Re-opens with Success

Jackson, Wyo. - After a 10-year hiatus, the Wyoming Game and Fish Department decided bighorn sheep populations were once again sufficient to reopen sheep Hunt Area 24 in the Wyoming Range west of Big Piney. To be conservative, they issued just one license and that lucky recipient is glad they did. Greg Fischer of Alpine, Wyo. was the fortunate one who drew the single license and on the second day of the season he found himself a dandy Wyoming ram.

The last native bighorn sheep are believed to have disappeared from the Wyoming Range in the early 1960s. It is not known specifically what caused their extirpation, but it was likely a combination of factors. However, soon after their disappearance, wildlife managers began making preparations to bring them back.

Fish Creek and Darby Mountain winter ranges provided the best bighorn sheep habitat in the range. Grazing by domestic sheep was discontinued in these areas and forage production studies suggested a capacity of 150 to 175 bighorn sheep in most winters.

In 1981, the Wyoming Game and Fish Department, in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service and the Foundation for North American Wild Sheep (FNAWS), made the first reintroduction of 35 Rocky Mountain bighorn sheep into the Wyoming Range. The sheep were trapped and transplanted from the Whiskey Basin Wildlife Habitat Management Area near Dubois, Wyoming, to Fish Creek Mountain. Similarly, in January of 1987, another 25 bighorn sheep were transplanted from Whiskey Basin to the Fish Creek Mountain site.

A comprehensive ground and aerial survey conducted in the summer of 1988 revealed a minimum of 124 sheep. Based on this information, in the fall of 1988, the first bighorn sheep hunting season was conducted in the Wyoming Range, Hunt Area 24. Four permits were issued for rams with a minimum of 3/4 curl horn and four rams were harvested. By 1994, the population was estimated at approximately 150 sheep, but it is believed that soon after that they began to decline. The department issued four permits for 3/4 curl rams from 1988 through 1997, but fewer sheep were being seen by Game and Fish biologists and hunters were having a harder time finding rams in the latter years. In 1997, there were

no rams harvested and the Game and Fish decided to close the season.

"Sheep are a sensitive species to manage, especially a small population such as the Darby Mountain herd," said Game and Fish Wildlife Biologist Gary Fralick. "But with some habitat improvements and restrictions on motorized travel in important sheep habitat along the spine of the Wyoming Range, we hope to bring the number in the Darby Mountain herd back to historical highs."

Historically, the Game and Fish has been obligated to offer a minimum of four sheep licenses, three resident and 1 nonresident, in any given Hunt Area. In 2008, changes were made to allow those four licenses to be

allocated across different Hunt Areas. This change allowed biologists to offer a single sheep license in Hunt Area 24. While wildlife managers believe the Darby Mountain sheep herd has rebounded enough to offer some hunting opportunity, they wanted to start conservatively.

Greg Fischer of Alpine, Wyo. has put in for sheep Hunt Area 24 every year it has been offered and collected his preference points in the years it was closed. He wanted to hunt there because it was close to home and he knew the country well. As luck would have it, Fischer, now 63, drew the single license offered this year.

Despite knowing the country well, this was not an easy hunt for Fischer. As he put it, he "doesn't get around too good these days". You see, in 2000, Fischer was severely mauled by a grizzly bear while hunting caribou in Alaska. He and a hunting partner surprised the bear at close range in thick alders. Fischer said the grizzly attacked crushing both of his legs above the ankle and "took a good bite" out of his thigh. His hunting partners then spent the next 12 hours dragging him out of the bush on a tarp to reach medical help. Fischer has had four operations on his legs to correct the inju-

buddies, Fischer found himself on the mountain looking at the ram he wanted in a group of 11. next day greeted them with a cold, driving wind much shut them down for the day.

The next day was more favorable and they soon came across a group of five rams. With plenty of time to watch them, Fischer finally saw the one he wanted. After getting into position, Fischer fired and the ram piled up in the rocks. Fischer said he didn't "need a good one", but that's what he got. The handsome set of horns measured 36 inches long and were "broomed" off nicely at the end. The annual rings said it was 10 years old, indicating it was born the year the season was first closed.

"This area has a history of producing quality rams, and with the change in the regulation we can once again provide the opportunity to hunt," said Fralick. "We will continue to be conservative with hunting this population, but this is a good sign for this sheep herd and people who value bighorn sheep."

"It took a lot of things to come together for me to get this ram," said Fischer. "I needed a lot help from my friends and from the Game and Fish. I really appreciate what the Game and Fish has done to bring back the sheep."

Editor's Note: Wyoming FNAWS played a key role in providing this and other hunting opportunities by advocating for a change to the "four licenses per hunt area" regulation. Teamwork with Wyoming FNAWS and the Wyoming Game and Fish has once again benefited wild sheep and sports enthusiasts alike.
